

# SERVICE PROTOCOLS

#### Decorum

When you enter our sanctuary for prayer, please turn your phones off completely. Disconnect from the mobile world so you can speak and hear your prayers and feel your connection with the whole community.

#### Children

Children are always encouraged to participate in the main sanctuary's service. A break room will be available for children and parents to use.

## Toys

Just as we ask adults to turn off their smartphones, we also ask that electronic children's toys and colouring materials stay out of the main sanctuary. Children are welcome to bring puzzles, books, stuffed animals, and the like instead.

# Sanctifying Space

You are encouraged to pace yourself throughout services and attend as you see fit. Please make every effort to keep the main sanctuary doors closed after you enter and exit so those in services will not be distracted by outside noise.

# Security for the High Holidays

On High Holidays additional security is provided by contract with the Halifax Regional Police in the form of uniformed officers on the street.

Additionally, volunteer ushers and ticket takers will be positioned inside both doors.

The exterior doors are not locked during High Holiday services, and the role of greeter is shared by the caretaker and volunteers.

# **Seating**

High Holiday tickets are eTickets once again this year. Please check in with the greeters upon your arrival.



# **Child Care During High Holiday Services**

There will be childcare services provided during the High Holidays.

In the Gold Room upstairs there will be snacks, juice, and supervision for younger children. The library upstairs will remain open for older children to rest and talk quietly during services.

# FROM OUR EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Dear Members,

While the last five months have been overshadowed by the demands of the restorations in our shul, there have been many positives to highlight this year as

well. We have welcomed new members, built up our Hebrew school, and expanded our programming with a number of lectures and special projects. Thank you for engaging with other members of our community, and also with other communities through outreach, learning and action. The fire on Quinpool Road in April has brought us through a time of loss, as significant damage had us jumping through insurance and renovation hoops to be able to gather together again for the holidays. We deeply appreciate the support our community has shown these last months. You have donated and offered to connect us with resources—from insurance advisors, to building advice and support, and transport of Torahs, and to create an alternate prayer space in the Gold Room. You have been flexible when simchas have needed shifting in location and style. You have also provided emotional support in your words and efforts, and those cheerleaders have helped us keep going in this work.

# Rebuild, Renew, Restore

36 hours of active firefighting flooded our basement, destroying our electrical and heating systems. The force of the water from the firehoses pushed open the windows at the back of the sanctuary, allowing water to ruin the floors, and soot to damage the ceilings. The executive was flooded with calls and emails as we assured the congregation that the Torahs, chumashim, siddurim and other ritual items were safe.

# **Our Space**

As we write this, the **sanctuary** is still being worked on, and we hope it has been beautifully redone by the time you read this. Any asbestos has been abated, with the flooring and ceiling replaced and upgraded. A fresh coat of paint marks a new year, and we hope this space will continue to be both a religious space as well as a hub for Jewish life in this city.

The **basement apartment** has been fully gutted, with walls, cabinetry, and flooring redone. It has been decorated to function as a multipurpose

Our green space was rented for the duration of the construction of the residential building that will soon be our neighbour. We anticipate this will be ongoing until at least the spring, and perhaps the entire year. We welcome your ideas and thoughts on how we can use this space to stay relevant as a synagogue and a Jewish hub as the city's Jewish community demographic changes.

# Internal Programming at the Shaar

Creating value for membership is important to all of us as we need a sustainable plan for the future. Expanded programming and partnerships are a way to enable different access points for membership, and to have a variety of ways for members to use the Shaar's facility. Applying for grants from the Canadian Race Relationship Foundation and the Province of Nova Scotia has allowed us to do more with less, and legacy gifts like the endowments from the Glube, Heinish, Perlin, Pascal and Wexler families have allowed us to use the interest earned from these funds to expand our capacity to provide meaningful, fun, and interesting programming for members.

Thank you, Rabbi Karlin, for your consistent **adult education** at the shul. Weekly education series on the Mishnah, as well as weekly introduction to Judaism classes have allowed us to continually learn and grow as a congregation.

The **Shaar Shalom Choir** continues, and Ezra Wexler celebrated his 20th year as choir director in 5785. Thank you to Ezra and all of the choir members for adding a spiritual depth to our high holiday services.

We held a number of **Speaker series** this year, including authors Ayelet Tsabari (relocated to the Halifax Public Library due to the Quinpool fire) and Sharon Easton.



We held some interesting lectures with special Q&A with our **On the Ground** in Israel Series by Zoom and in person. These conversations from a variety of diverse voices across the political spectrum were an opportunity to engage in nuance and a deepening of our understanding of Israel and the current conflict. We spoke with three voices on the ground. Dr. David Koren, CEO of the Jerusalem Institute for Policy Research an expert on Hamas ideology spoke to us of the shift in views and ideologies coming out of East Jerusalem. Corey Gil-Shuster, of the You-tube series, "Ask an Israeli, Ask a Palestinian" spoke about his ask project, doing street level interviews amongst a variety of communities across Israeli society, as well as Palestinian communities across Judaea and Samaria (West Bank). We also spoke with Manar Al-Sharif, a Syrian born woman who was wrongfully imprisoned by Hamas in Gaza for organizing coexistence programs between Israelis and Gazans in 2020.

We hosted a special Shabbat Dinner and Speaker with the Jerusalem Foundation, where we heard Daniela Seltzer of Jerusalem Food Rescuers discuss food security and sustainability in Israel after October 7.



Sharing your passions as a congregation is a great way to build community. A Rosh Hashana baking class with Natalie Zak was a delicious way to start the year, with members baking apple muffins and other

sweet treats for the holiday. Belly Dancing night at the Shaar with dance instructor Jill Chatt was a fun way to gather and break up the winter blues! Family Story Time in the library was a success and we plan to continue with more kids' programming in the coming year. If you have ideas or would like to work on projects or programming, please reach out!

The **Breaking Challah, Building Bridges** grant continued this year. In partnership with the Canadian Race Relations Foundation, we have been

exploring Jewish diversity through food. Six programs, Shabbat dinners or Sunday brunches over 5784 and 5785 will look at our connections with different communities, our own internal intersections of cultural traditions, nationalities, and sexual and gender perspectives. The program continued with Sky Smith at the helm to coordinate volunteers and plan the programming. Unfortunately, due to the fire, several programs were postponed to 5786. The highlight of the year was a **Shabbat dinner with the African Nova Scotian community** and speaker April Howe. This sold-out dinner was very moving for both communities and we are strengthening and expanding this connection over the coming year.

Thank you, Judith Bates, for reinstituting the **Grief Support Group** at the Shaar alongside Rabbi Karlin. This meets an important need for our Shaar community and is part of a network of support at the Shaar.

#### New Initiatives at the Halifax Hebrew School

Under the guidance of co-chairs Ariela Conter and Robyn Brown, Hebrew school has been reviewing curriculum and structure to address the demographic shifts in the wider Jewish community and the changing needs of our membership. To this end, we expanded the reading program to include a native Hebrew speaker group and held a special Hebrew School Shabbat dinner to give students a chance to participate in a Friday night service and enjoy a fun Shabbat dinner together. The Quinpool fire significantly impacted our school, and we are tremendously thankful to the Beth Israel and Armbrae Academy for opening their doors so that Hebrew School could continue. We look forward to an **expanded Hebrew School** that will open an outreach program with a **Hebrew immersion stream for 5786.** 

# Partnerships with Other Institutions

Students from **Hillel**, working closely with Rabbi Karlin, used the Shaar apartment as well as the Gold Room for Shabbat dinners throughout the year. The AJC also ran one class of **Kachol Lavan** students at the same time as Hebrew School. For 5786, the Hebrew School will be absorbing the Hebrew Immersion class as an outreach and integration initiative.

#### Outreach Initiatives

Sometimes our security is provided by police officers, and sometimes it is invested in our building relationships with our neighbours. Both are strategic and contribute to our safety, with many of these initiatives having been in place for a number of years. Despite the strain of the past year, these partnerships have been important contacts for us to connect and advocate for the Shaar and the wider Jewish community moving into

the future. Working with the AJC, **Training of Incoming Halifax Regional Police Officers** took place at the Shaar, complete with a tour of the Shaar for the trainees.

The Shaar welcomed visitors for a Shabbat service and was active in a variety of ways in Interfaith Harmony Halifax again this year. We had Shaar representation on the organizing team, and hosted



a new initiative, Interfaith Harmony Halifax Paint night. Despite poor weather, we had a lovely group from several communities, and it was a nice chance for us to interact and get to know each other better.

The Saul Green Memorial Lecture was held again this year, after a bit of a




hiatus. This year's lecture was Disability Distributive Justice and the History of Ventilator Allocation Protocols, by Dr. Mara Mills. A sincere thank you to Roselle Green and the members of the Green family for sponsoring this lecture and

special dinner with the President of King's College.

Our Dalhousie Shaar lecture, with a focus on Human Rights, is a high-profile feature of our outreach in the community. We thank the series donor and Seth Bloom for his long-time work on this lecture series. Because of the disappointing Dalhousie response to campus antisemitism, the Shaar Board of Directors has chosen to pause participation in the series again this year and will continue working with Dalhousie on steps to better ensure the safety of Jewish students and faculty on campus. We hope our efforts will be successful, and there will be meaningful change.

# Policy Changes in the 5785 Year

At the AGM, a new Inclusion Policy for Interfaith Families was officially approved by the congregation. This policy codifies our inclusive practices and gives us ways to further support diverse families. It is part of our mandate to help Jewish families keep connected to community and spiritual



# **Fundraising**

We are pleased to share that we had several successful fundraisers last year. The Kol Nidre campaign and High Holiday Bulletin brought in needed funds to continue valuable programs and initiatives. Thank you, Linda Law, for your leadership on the Bulletin. It is a real highlight of the work that we do at the Shaar. The Shabbat dinner program has also received additional donations from members who would like to encourage their continued success.

Alice Bruce, Johanne Solomon, and Linda Law hosted a very successful Hanukkah Sale, where we had beautiful Judaica for sale and benefited from our long-standing partnership with Woozles and Bookmark. Thank you for all your support. We could not continue this work without your contributions.

# **Legacy Gifts Leave a Lasting Impact**

# FROM OUR RABBI

The Yamim haNora'im are a time to look backward and forward: back at our lives during the past year, and forward to the year upcoming. We assess, consider, decide on changes we want to make. We judge ourselves and resolve to improve. We perform heshbon hanefesh ("figuring our souls out") and



**teshuvah** ("returning to righteousness") in our own lives and the lives of our families.

As the Rabbi of Shaar Shalom, this time of year also brings me to another sort of *ḥeshbon*, looking back at the entire span of time in which I have enjoyed the privilege and responsibility of leading the Shaar, to start to think about what the future might bring.

None of us can judge events as if they existed in a vacuum, isolated and removed from any context. The past years have been incredibly complicated and surprising. First there was the two-year challenge of Covid. Then, October 7 and the war against Hamas, now almost two years on. And, most recently, the damage to our synagogue building and reconstruction since last Pesaḥ. If God blesses me with grandchildren and they ask, "Saba, tell us what life was like in Halifax?", I know I'll have some stories that will make their eyes open wide.

Each one of these three challenges came to us from the outside: from nature, from enemies, and from the carelessness of neighbours. There have been other trials to Jewish life in Halifax: The weakening of the ties that bind community – real, physical, proximal community, not social media connections. The increasing secularization of life and focus on the individual, not the collective. The decline in identification with the State of Israel among our people and lessening of support for the Jewish State in Canada and much of the western world generally. In a nutshell, we need to consider how all these changes will impact the future of Jewish life in Halifax generally, and the Shaar in particular.

Synagogues like ours are unique in the Jewish world, as they embody the heart and soul of what it means to live as a Jew. To paraphrase the

famous words of Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan, Judaism may be the full and varied civilization of our people, but it is a *religious* civilization. Torah (in the widest sense, encompassing all Jewish wisdom and holy literature) is at the very core of Judaism – a legacy that infuses our values, gives us meaning and direction, and shapes our ritual and ethical living.

One of the obligations of any rabbi is to inspire individuals to move from conviction to action: toward repairing relationships, toward ethical living, toward greater meaning and spiritual striving, toward observance of mitzvot, toward deepening connections to God and our Jewish community. This work will certainly be undertaken by each individual, but the fruits are felt widely throughout the congregation and the wider community. Like the threads of a fabric made into a garment, the results of these little pieces of *teshuvah*, nurtured by family, community and rabbi, often yield surprising and wonderful outcomes.

No individual, and no rabbi, can do this work alone. A rabbi only succeeds (or fails, God forbid) in the context of days and months and years of working with others. Little by little, over the years, our personal lives and our community are strengthened. We all gain from this growth. As we begin the new year of 5786, I invite you to join me and the other members of Shaar Shalom Congregation to continue to labour in this **avodah kedoshah**, this holy work. As Rabbi Tarfon taught (Avot 2:15-16),

The day is short, but the work needed is huge. The laborers are indolent, but the reward is great. The master of the house is insistent. You may not neglect the task, even if is not your duty to finish it alone.

# TO LIVE JEWISHLY

Rosh Hashana marks the creation of the world, according to Jewish tradition. Truly, it is a celebration of creation and the possibilities that abound in this world for the year to come. If Hashem created humanity in Hashem's own image, are we not imbued with a divine capacity to create as well? Marking this holiday reminds me that over the course of the year, my inherent creative spirit quickly wanes, overtaken by the flurry of responsibilities and tasks that mark the life of a working parent of a preschooler, a wife, daughter, sister, friend, and mentor. This Rosh Hashana, I am committing myself to finding a more enduring sense of creativity.

The great secular prophet, Oscar Wilde, wrote: "To live is the rarest thing in the world: most people exist, that is all." Over the past few years, my impression is that the Jews and non-Jews alike are focused on Jewish existence – should they, why, where, at whose expense? In these discussions, the existence of Israel has somehow become tied to the existence of Jews. The views of Jews, Jewish families, Jewish communities, and the rest of the world on these foundational questions painfully diverge.

To me, existence alone is an unsatisfyingly passive goal. Jewish living, by contrast, strikes that creative spark within me. I find myself asking, what does it mean to live, and not merely exist, as a Jew? Many texts have been written around the theme of being a Jew. Some that have recently inspired me are:

- Why Be Jewish, by Edgar M. Bronfman,
- To Be a Jew Today: A New Guide to God, Israel, and the Jewish People, by Noah Feldman, and
- The Jewish Way to a Good Life: Find Happiness, Build Community, and Embrace Lovingkindness, by Rabbi Shira Stutman.

And below, I present some personal ideas for Jewish living. To carry myself forward into the new year with intention, to be active and creative, my personal mitzvot/commandments for how I will try to live Jewishly are:

אָהַבְּתָּ לְרֵעְךְ כָּמוֹךְ – Ve-ahavtah l'reacha kamocha – Love your fellow as yourself. I will try

to actively empathize with others and hope that others will do the same for me

קְדֶק אֱדֶק אֱדֶק תְרְדִּץ – Tzedek Tzedek Tirdof – Justice, justice, you shall pursue. I will seek ways to actively rectify and make whole, where I perceive there to be error and loss.

We are very grateful that David Zer Aviv has agreed to be our chazzan for the 5786 High Holiday services.



# BREAKING CHALLAH, BUILDING BRIDGES

Since its launch in early 2024, Breaking Challah, Building Bridges has used food and conversation as the foundation for building stronger community connections. With the Shaar Shalom Synagogue as its home, the program offers two distinct types of gatherings: Shabbat dinners, featuring a culturally inspired meal and a keynote speaker; and Bagel & Talks brunches, with lox, cream cheese, and a panel discussion designed to spark dialogue.




The first Shabbat Dinner celebrated the traditions of the Bene Israel Jewish community of India, with speakers Nishka Rajesh and Ranjeev Chopra sharing stories of history, culture, and connection. 


#### RITUAL COMMITTEE REPORT

The fire on Quinpool Road that affected the synagogue building so drastically also kept the Ritual Committee busy from April until September. Torah covers and scrolls, Judaica silver, siddurim, and chumashim all had to be checked for smoke damage (they were unharmed). For safe keeping, sifrei Torah were moved into storage at the Nova Scotia Archives on Robie Street.

Even though the building lost power, there was no interruption of Shabbat services while renovations were going on. Until the building was deemed safe, Shaar members were warmly invited to attend services at the Beth Israel. Some services and b'nai mitzvah were held at the Atlantica Hotel; for these, the Beth Ient their smallest Torah so that Rabbi Karlin, who lives a few blocks from the hotel, could walk it over and back. In advance, the Rabbi had worked with the kitchen at the Atlantica to kasher it for us

By mid-May, once the building was cleared, seating in the Gold Room upstairs was reorganized so that services could be held there, with kiddushim being prepared out of the small kitchen by Luba.

All during the upheaval, friends and neighbours helped in whatever way they could, with the generosity of Beth Israel especially appreciated.



The Ritual Committee continues to look for volunteers on a number of fronts: to perform Gabbaim duties, participate in services, read haftorot, or to serve in any capacity they can. Please contact Yariv Wolfe or the Rabbi to discuss how you can contribute to this central function of the synagogue.

# Annual Report 2025, The Simon L. Gaum Bereavement Centre

The Simon L. Gaum Bereavement Centre (SGBC) at Shaar Shalom Congregation helps congregational families going through a loss by providing them with guidance and support immediately after the death and throughout the difficult Shiva period. The Centre works to ensure that its services continue to be aligned with its original mandate while meeting the ongoing needs of the congregation during their bereavement period.

Some of the services the Bereavement Centre was involved with this past year include:

- Providing timely information to congregants regarding funerals, burials, and Shiva.
- Extending sympathy to congregants who have suffered a loss.
- Providing a Shiva basket to mourners of an immediate family member who were observing Shiva locally (which includes a book on mourning and a yahrzeit candle).
- Supplying the Shiva home with Shiva chairs, prayer books, kippot, and tallisim.

• Providing community resource information to mourners for a variety of needs during this period and helping to meet these needs.

While not a part of the SGBC, the **Shaar Shalom Grief Support Group** collaborates with the committee by providing congregants with resource and contact information.

# **HOUSE COMMITTEE REPORT**

Any report from the House Committee will be dominated by news about the damage to the building caused by the April fire on Quinpool Road. Water damage to the basement and smoke damage to most of the building meant we went without power for several months and cleaning had to be done to all the floors, walls, and most of the ceilings. The insurance pay-out and donations from the R3 (Rebuild, Renew, Restore) fund have allowed us not just to restore but also to rebuild.

- The heating system has been upgraded to natural gas
- The ceilings and flooring in the main sanctuary have been replaced, as well as walls, flooring and cabinets in the basement apartment.
- The sanctuary flooring has been upgraded to a durable vinyl product that looks like wood, with a 30-year durability rating for industrial flooring. This has given us an updated design without sacrificing durability.
- The main sanctuary, kitchen, side classroom, and basement have all been freshly painted.

The damage to our contents was quite limited and most of the main sanctuary was undamaged. The Torahs, chumashim, siddurim, chairs, lights, carpets, and bima have all remained the same. The sanctuary looks and feels like home, with a bit of a refresh.

Thanks to your donations to the R3 (Rebuild Renew Restore) Fund, we have raised a significant amount towards these upgrades so far. The board has also approved moving forward with bathroom renovations to

increase accessibility for our members for 2025/2026 and this upgrade, once quotes are collected and approved, will be incorporated into our R3 fundraising push in the fall.

We are so grateful to be back "home" for the High Holidays.



# IN MEMORIAM

# LLOYD MERRILL NEWMAN, z"I

# September 30, 2024

Lloyd Merrill Newman died at home in Halifax on September 30, 2024, one day after his 90th birthday. He was the loving husband of Linda Law and the proud father of Mark Newman (Barbara), Amy Newman Brown (Mitchell), and the late Shawna Newman (Charley Kummel).

Born in Detroit, Michigan, on September 29, 1934, Lloyd graduated from the University of Michigan in 1956 before becoming a first lieutenant, US Air Force, from 1956 to 1959 (navigator, electronic warfare officer). In 1960 he moved to Halifax where his first wife, Iris Cappell, had grown up, and started from the ground up working at a small local family business which he subsequently built into a 20-store Atlantic Canadian chain of women's fashion stores called the Arcade Ladies Shoppe in Nova Scotia and Nortell's in Newfoundland, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island. At the chain, he was universally beloved as a fair and supportive boss, encouraging young talent and seeing potential where they themselves often did not.

When the chain closed, Lloyd took a one-year position in London, Ontario, as executive director of the London Jewish Federation, before moving back to Halifax, marrying Linda, and becoming the managing director of the Northwood Foundation, a position he held for 14 years. At Northwood he was credited with putting the foundation on the fundraising map, so to speak, founding signature events such as the annual Appetite for Life fundraising gala (now called Live More Awards) and other smaller events that raised the profile of Northwood.

Lloyd was predeceased by his parents, Joseph and Miriam "May" Newman; his brothers Ray and Robert "Bob"; and his beloved daughter Shawna. He is survived by his wife of many years Linda "Linnie" Law; his son Mark and daughter Amy; his grandchildren Joseph "Joey" (Noelle), Eli, Leah (Adam Birnbaum), Hannah, Chloe, and Max; as well as niece and nephews Richard, David, and Nancy Newman.

Lloyd was a generous and trusted volunteer for the Jewish community in Halifax and Atlantic Canada: past president of the Atlantic Jewish Council;

past chair, Congregation Shaar Shalom Capital and Endowment Fund; past president (twice) of the Board of Directors of Shaar Shalom Synagogue; and past national secretary of the Canada–United Israel Appeal.

Throughout his life he was a passionate lover of and volunteer for the arts. He loved all forms of artistic expression: theatre, music, dance, the visual arts.

At various points in his life, he was past president and life director of Neptune Theatre in Halifax and long-time governor of the National Theatre School of Canada. He was president of Symphony Nova Scotia and widely credited with helping to resurrect it from the ashes of the bankrupt Atlantic Symphony. In 1990 he was appointed to set up and chair the Nova Scotia Film Development Corporation, which was established to promote and subsidize Nova Scotia's motion picture industry (in 2008 the Crown corporation's name was changed to Film Nova Scotia). From 1984 to 1989 he was appointed to represent Atlantic Canada on the board of The Canada Council, the country's federal arts funder, whose mandate is to foster and promote the arts. He was a former member of the Board of Governors of the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design (NSCAD); vicechair, Board of Governors of Nova Scotia Museums; and member of the Prince Edward Scholarship Committee for the Province of Nova Scotia.

In 1992 he was awarded a Canada 125 Medal in recognition of his contribution to the arts.

Before Alzheimer's intervened, Lloyd was a passionate and inventive cook—noisy, messy, fearless: steam rising, pots rattling, opera blasting in the background. Neighbours always knew when he was preparing for a dinner party. He loved entertaining guests at home and enjoyed his own cooking unabashedly, often interrupting the table conversation to exclaim, "Wow, this is really good!"

Lloyd's friends were lucky, and they knew it. He was the best of friends to many, many people: non-judgmental, supportive, and generous. Throughout his life Lloyd was a passionate golfer and tennis player for whom the social aspects of the game (and post-game activities) were nearly as compelling as the game itself.

The arts and Jewish community have lost a dedicated and zealous advocate.
